Minutes of the 94th Annual Meeting of the AAVSO, Held October 14–15, 2005, Newton, Massachusetts

The 94th Annual Meeting of the AAVSO was held in Newton, Massachusetts, October 14–15, 2005, at the Sheraton Newton Hotel, and at AAVSO Headquarters in Cambridge. Our hosts were the AAVSO Headquarters staff.

On Thursday, October 13, the AAVSO Council meeting took place from noon to 6 pm. Registration opened at 1:00 pm for early arrivals. The afternoon and evening were a time to become acquainted and renew old friendships.

On Friday, October 14, the meeting officially began. The morning session included two Workshops, held concurrently. The subject of the first was "Advanced Visual Observing", organized by Michael Simonsen. Topics covered were "The Value of Visual Observations" by Elizabeth O. Waagen, "The Eye as a Photometer" by Michael Linnolt, "Visual Observing of Faint Variables from the Heart of England" by Gary Poyner (presented from Gary's home in the heart of England via internet webcam link), "Catch a Rising Star: CV's for Visual Observers" by Michael Simonsen, "Calibrating Your Eyes to Match the V-Magnitude Scale" by Sebastian Otero of Argentina, and "A Historical Talk on Clint Ford and Charts" by Charles Scovil.

The topic of the second Workshop was "Image Reduction and Analysis Facility (IRAF)", presented by Pamela Gay, an AAVSO member and instructor for the Harvard University Science Center. IRAF, a very powerful package for data reduction and analysis, is known for its long learning curve. Pamela helped ease the pain by highlighting features most relevant to AAVSO observers, discussing computer needs, and showing attendees some of the tricks to becoming one with your IRAF installation.

A lunch break and time to discuss variable star issues followed. The first of two Scientific Paper Sessions was held from 2:00 to 5:00 pm and the papers on the accompanying list were presented. In the evening, a buffet dinner at AAVSO Headquarters was held for all attendees. Staff members were present to answer questions, assist with the use of the AAVSO International Database, and provide tours of the facility.

The Membership Meeting was called to order by President William G. Dillon at 9:00 am on Saturday, October 15. Minutes of the 94th Spring Meeting, held in Las Cruces, New Mexico, were read by Secretary Gary Walker. A summary of the Treasurer's Report was read by Treasurer Louis Cohen.

Director Arne Henden reported that 54 new membership applications had been approved by the Council for the second half of the year. He also reported that members and friends of the Association deceased during that period were Fred Whipple, Phillip Morrison, James Baker, Marie-Odile Mennessier, Dick Walker, Ron Stone, Dorothy Beetle-Pilmore, and Walter Feibelman. Attendees stood in a moment of silence to honor them.

Director Henden gave his Annual Report, which follows these Minutes. Among the highlights were: the first Janet Mattei Fellowship awarded and research carried out; excellent progress made in the areas of charts, comparison star sequences, and digitization of comparison star information; work on the Automated Chart Plotter begun; *eJAAVSO* created (papers accepted for *JAAVSO* now posted to the AAVSO website after refereeing); membership database converted to MYSQL; 3rd AAVSO High-Energy Astrophysics Workshop for Amateur Astronomers and 2nd annual AAVSO Symposium held; Wayne Lowder's 94,946 remaining observations and A. W. Robert's 70,000 historical observations added to the AAVSO International Database.

Director Henden announced that the 95th Spring Meeting will be held in Rockford, Illinois, May 5–6, 2006, and will be hosted by Barry and Carol Beaman. He also announced that the 95th Annual Meeting will be held in Newton, Massachusetts, on October 27–28. Locations under consideration for future meetings include Calgary, Alberta, Canada, for Spring 2007, and England with the British Astronomical Society for Spring 2008.

President Bill Dillon announced that the newly elected councilors were Barry Beaman, Pamela Gay, Arto Oksansen, and Mike Simonsen. Bill thanked the nominating committee for its excellent work. The membership meeting was adjourned by President Dillon at 11:44 am for lunch and a group photo.

After lunch David Levy, one of the afternoon speakers, kindly signed books for numerous attendees. The afternoon sessions started at 1 pm with a public workshop on "Beginning Visual Observing", which concentrated on topics for new observers and the general astronomy public. David kicked things off with a talk on Leslie Peltier. David B. Williams discussed binocular observing, while Mike Simonsen encouraged deep sky observers to hop over to variables near or in deep sky objects. AAVSO observers Gene Hansen and Glenn Chaple discussed

observing tips, techniques, and tools for the beginning observer.

The second Scientific Paper Session convened at 2:00 pm. The papers presented are given on the accompanying list. Both afternoon sessions adjourned at 5:30pm.

Attendees gathered at the Sheraton in the evening for the closing banquet and awards presentation. After a delicious dinner, awards were presented. Special awards were presented to Charles A. Whitney, in recognition of his thirty years of service as Editor of the Journal of the AAVSO, and to Charles E. Scovil, recognizing his forty years of volunteer service, including thirty-five years as Chair of the Telescope Committee and thirteen years as Chair of the New Charts Committee. Faithful Headquarters volunteer and solar observer Arthur Ritchie received his Solar Observer Award for his sunspot observations. Service Awards were presented to staff members Rebecca Turner and Travis Searle, recognizing ten years and five years, respectively. An AAVSO Supernova Award was awarded to Rev. Robert O. Evans for his visual discovery of SN 2005df in NGC 1559 and will be sent to him in Australia. The William Tyler Olcott Distinguished Service Award was presented posthumously to late Director Janet Akyüz Mattei and was accepted by Mike Mattei. The recipient of the 37th AAVSO Merit Award was longtime AAVSO member, Councilor, and Secretary Martha L. Hazen. Martha was not able to attend the meeting, so the award had been presented to her at her home prior to the meeting by Arne Henden and Elizabeth Waagen, with videographer Travis Searle recording the event for posterity and viewing at the Annual Meeting. After the award was announced and displayed, the video was greatly enjoyed by all.

Following the awards presentations, Headquarters staff members Aaron Price, Astronomical Technical Assistant, Technology, and Katherine Davis, Astronomical Technical Assistant, Web, presented an entertaining and informative talk on the AAVSO website, including its history, some of its many impressive features, and thoughts for future development.

At the end of the evening, prior to stepping down, President Dillon remarked on his two years in office, with their enormous, unimagined challenges for the Association and for himself. Attendees responded with hearty applause and thanks for a difficult job well done. Bill turned the gavel over to incoming President David B. Williams, who, after making remarks that were warmly received by the attendees, adjourned the meeting.
